CAN I DO RIGHT WHEN I'VE BEEN DONE WRONG?

Text: **James 5:7-11** We've all experienced the hurt of mistreatment, misunderstanding, intolerable work situations, family conflicts, etc. Our natural tendency is often to retaliate, return evil for evil, to get back, or hold a grudge and become bitter in our soul. When we're hurt, taken advantage of, or used by others, our nature says, "strike back." But God's approach is patient endurance. Anyone can submit to one who is considerate, gracious and gentle. There is no virtue in such submission because there is no threat of mistreatment. But trials of the sort mentioned above, as trying as they are, must still be endured (James 1:12).

How should we react when we have been done wrong? James says first in verses 7 & 8 to be patient. Why? Because God is not going to right all wrongs until Jesus returns; so believers must be patient. Patience means to stay put and stand fast when you'd like to run away. How can we as Christians experience this kind of patience as we wait for Christ's return? Like the farmer who waits for the seed to grow and produce plants, Luke 8:11 says our hearts are the soil and the word of God is the seed. Time and work precede the harvest (1 Cor. 3:6). This is the secret to endurance (5:11). God is producing a harvest by allowing trials and troubles in our lives.

Second, when being patient and holding back a reaction for a long time, we become discouraged and filled with self-pity. James says, "strengthen (establish) your heart." You can't enjoy the harvest unless your hearts is established.

Third, we are not to complain (vs.11). We shouldn't complain because complaining conveys the idea of sighing or groaning, and suggests bearing a grudge. God has a way of balancing privileges with responsibilities, blessings with burdens. If it were not so, you and I would be spoiled, pampered children. In the story of Job we see distress, defense, and deliverance. Job did not realize what was going on behind the scenes with God and Satan. He lost his wealth, health, and children. His wife, and friends were against him, and it even seemed God was against him. (continued on page 3)

What did the story of Job mean to the believers James wrote to and to us today? It means that some trials of life are caused directly by Satan, and God will allow this but with limitations. Satan wants us to be impatient with God. The answer for us is found in 2 Cor. 12:7-9, God's grace is sufficient.

Last of all, James says in verse 12, do not swear. The Greek term translated "swear" means to, "grasp something firmly, or sacredly for the purpose of supporting what one is saying or doing." When we suffer we should not try to tie God into our explanations. It's easy to say things we don't mean or even bargain with God when difficulties come. The application is simple:

- 1. Don't focus on the situation or we'll become angry.
- 2. Don't focus on ourselves or we'll become filled with self-pity.
- 3. Don't focus on someone to blame or we'll begin complaining.
- 4. Don't focus on the present, or we'll miss the point of what God is trying to achieve in our lives.
