The "Sinner's Prayer"

Millions of tracts have been distributed in hospitals, restaurants, etc., with some version of "the sinner's prayer." There are many differing versions, since this "prayer" is man-made and is not to be found in the Bible. The Bible makes it very clear that prayer is the privilege of Christians, not alien sinners (Matt. 6:9, 1 Pet. 3:12).

God has no children outside of His family, who can call him Father. One must be "in Christ" to be called a son or daughter of God. To be in Christ means to be in His church or body (2 Cor. 6:17-18, Eph. 1:22-23, Col. 1:18). All must enter into Christ in the same way, by faith, repentance, confession, and baptism, but not prayer (John 8:24, Luke 13:3, Matt. 10:32-33, Mark 15:15-16). The first thing a sinner needs to do is obey — not pray (Heb. 5:8-9). Yet, there are some religious folks who do not teach God's desires for all men to be saved in His appointed way (1 Tim. 2:4). It gives the lost a false security to think they are saved by merely saying, "Lord Jesus, I believe you are the Son of God and that you died on the cross for my sins to save me from eternal death. I open the door of my life and receive you as my Savior and Lord. I give you my life. Help me to be what you want me to be. Amen."

Peter, by the Holy Spirit's guidance, told lost souls on Pentecost to obey, rather than pray (Acts 2:38). What Peter said then and what men say today does not match. Peter is right, men are wrong. Upon the command to "repent and be baptized" for their salvation, the Bible says they that "gladly received the word were baptized" and the Lord added them to the church (Acts 2:41, Acts 2:47). They then continued steadfastly in prayer (Acts 2:42).

The Bible says: God hears not sinners (John 9:31), He is far from the wicked (Prov. 15:9), "the sinner's prayer" is an abomination (Prov. 28:9), and that the face of the Lord is against evil doers (Psa. 34:16, 1 Pet. 3:12). We hope that these thoughts will encourage men to come into Christ, His church, where they may have the blessing of prayer as children of God. The "sinner's prayer" cannot be found in the pages of the New Testament.

Justification By Faith Includes Baptism

"By faith they passed through the Red Sea as by dry land: which the Egyptians assaying to do were swallowed up" (Heb. 11:29 ASV). The Israelites crossed the Red Sea "by faith," but they were not on the other side the moment they believed. They spent a night of anxious toil and great fear before they could sing the song of deliverance on the other side. Here the phrase "by faith" spans the Red Sea, and includes every step they took in crossing.

By some it is thought that because Paul says we are "justified by faith" (Rom. 5:1) that baptism is excluded. But the phrase "by faith," instead of excluding the acts of faith, which, in reality, make faith perfect, actually includes obedience. And it can be plainly shown that "by faith" in this case includes baptism. Paul says, "For I would not, brethren, have you ignorant, that our fathers were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea; and were all baptized unto Moses in the cloud and in the sea" (1 Cor. 10:1-2 ASV).

They crossed the Red Sea "by faith," and in crossing they were baptized. "By faith" includes what was done in crossing. But in crossing they were baptized. Therefore, "by faith," in this example includes baptism.

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A Matter Of Bible Authority

My objection to mechanical instruments in worship is not out of bitterness toward them; not because I think there is harm in the instrument, per se, but the objection is simply this: I have adopted the principle and pledged myself to the platform of not going beyond that which the Bible authorizes.

My digressive brother asks me, "Where does the Bible prohibit it?" I answer, "Where does the Bible authorize it?" Christians walk by faith (2 Cor. 5:7). No man can use mechanical instruments and walk by faith.

By searching the scriptures you will find that God does not authorize it, does not command it, does not demand it, and that there is no example in all apostolic history for such a practice. The man who is faithful and loyal to God's word will not go beyond it. "Whosoever goeth onward and abideth not in the teaching of Christ, hath not God" (2 John 9 ASV).
