WOULD YOU DIE...FOR CHOCOLATE PIE?

I "love" chocolate cake (not "pie" as the title suggests, since "die" rhymes with "pie" and not "cake" -- but I digress). I always have. I also love God. I "love" them both. What's the problem? Well, I know there's a difference in loving food, and loving God, so the problem is not my heart. The problem is my language. The word "love" in our language has basically been diluted, to the point that it has almost totally lost its original meaning. What other conclusion can you come to when one word can, to most people, encompass both food, and deity?

Obviously when I say "I love God," I mean something different than when I say "I love cake." The word is the same, but the meaning is clearly different, when you look at the context.

In the Greek language (commonly recognized as the language of the first century) when Christ asked Peter if he loved Him (John 21), he wasn't asking if he loved Him the same way he loved his favorite food. He wasn't asking if he loved Him the same way he loved his favorite pair of sandals. He was asking if he loved ("agapa" = in the original language) Him so much that he would die for Him. Peter wouldn't die for his favorite pair of sandals. I wouldn't die for chocolate cake (or "pie" if you're in a rhyming mood). And yet I say I "love" it?

It seems as though the word "love" has been used so flippantly, that its original meaning is hard to be discerned. A man may tell his significant other that he loves her, having just known her for a couple of weeks. Would he die for her? I think not. Eventually they may get married, and raise a family. Would he die for them then? Yes he would. Because now he truly "loves" them. The word has meaning to him now. Recall what Paul said about the sacrifice of Christ: "For when we were vet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly. For scarcely for a righteous man will one die: yet peradventure for a good man some would even dare to die. But God commended his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:6-8).

Christ died because He "loved" us. Would Christ have died for His favorite food (He was human, I'm sure He had a favorite food)? No. Would He have even said He "loved" his favorite food. Probably not. Consider what Paul said concerning the Christian's love for Christ: "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?... As it is written, For Thy sake we are killed all the day long..." (Romans 8:36). Would a Christian die for Christ? Yes. Why? Because he loves Christ. Would he die for...chocolate pie? No. Now tell me Let's make sure, then, that we're careful about the words we use. why...

Saul Of Tarsus Obeyed The Gospel

Saul was a great man among the Jews. He was strong in his belief and fought for it. He had letters of authority to go to Damascus and bring Christians there back to Jerusalem (Acts 9).

He was on his way to Damascus when a great light shone about him. It was so bright it caused him to be blinded and he fell to the ground and said, "Who art thou, Lord?" The Lord answered, "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest."

There must have been great fear in his words when Saul asked, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" (Acts 9:6). He was told to go on to Damascus, where it would be told him what he *must* do. Notice this: When Saul finds what to do, it will be what he *must* do.

He is led by the hand until he comes to Damascus, where he is praying when Ananias comes in (Acts 9:10-17). But Ananias did not tell him to, "Pray on," as some preachers would have told him if it had been in this age of the world. Instead, he told him to, "Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16).

Now, who would be so ignorant as to claim that Paul was saved by baptism alone? "Arise and be baptized" is what he *must* do, for that was what Ananias told him to do, as Jesus had said on the road.

The One Body

"There is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus; who gave himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time." (1 Tim. 2:5-6). Christ is the *only* mediator between God and men, and we cannot be saved except through him. Those who reject Christ will be left out.

Not only is there one God and one mediator between God and men, but there is one body (Eph. 4:4). "But now are they many members, yet but one body." (1 Cor. 12:20). That one body is the church (Eph. 1:22-23). Christ is the head of the church, as the man is the head of his wife. "For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body." (Eph. 5:23). That church is the one body, which is made up of Christians.

There are not two bodies — a kingdom and a church — for the church is the kingdom of Christ. This harmonizes with the statement that there is one body. Then there is "but one body", whether it be called "church" or "kingdom." Christ is the head of the church, or He is the King of the kingdom.

The Same Way Now

Since the church of Christ is still in existence, should I be considered out of order when I contend that people enter the church now just as the people in the first century? "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls" (Acts 2:41).

Peter preached the word, the people heard, believed, and repented, and the preachers baptized those who demanded it, but Christ accepted their obedience and received them into the church. "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved" (Acts 2:47). Are people added to the same church in the same way now? The answer is, "Yes," for the Bible has not changed, and neither has Jesus Christ. Will you obey the Lord as they did on Pentecost and be added to His church by Him?
